Gender and Otherness in the Humanities



Extract from The Orestes Project – By Jove Theatre Company

The Orestes Project is By Jove Theatre Company's ongoing performance development project in collaboration with Prof Nancy Rabinowitz of Hamilton College, NY. The project explores the relationships among the children of the house of Atreus: Orestes, Electra, and Iphigenia, exploring how the traumas of their shared history play out after the mythic narrative is over. In particular, the project explores queer relationships: Orestes' male 'companion' Pylades becomes his lover,

Iphigenia explores her desire for her goddess rescuer Artemis, and Electra navigates her relationship with herself and her mother's legacy. The performance is a work in progress, written and devised by the company, and combining text, music, movement, and other theatrical forms.

SJ Brady (Electra/Artemis/Director)

SJ is an actor, director, and writer. She has been performing with By Jove since 2011 and became Co-Artistic Director with David in 2017. She writes spoken word poetry and is part of the Young Vic Directors Program. SJ has a keen interest in feminist adaptation and has adapted *Othello* and *The Bacchae* for By Jove. She is specifically interested in writing and performing narratives accompanied by a musical score. She is currently developing a full collection of poetry while working in the West End



for a theatre producer. She enjoys dance, music, and art and currently resides in South East London.



Sinead Costelloe (Iphigenia)

Sinead is an actor. Her previous work with By Jove includes Homer's Women, Medea, Pride and Prejudice: The Panto, Before They Told You What You Are, and Othello. Other credits include: Plug In: Women Aren't Funny (Albany Theatre), Plug In (Canal Café Theatre), Mismatched (Old Red Lion Theatre), Beauty and the Beast (Theatre N16), A Christmas Carol (Teatro Sala de Umberto), and Mother Goose (Caboodle tour).

Marcus Bell (Orestes)

Marcus is a dancer, choreographer and scholar. Marcus is working on a PhD at the University of Oxford and is particularly interested in queer theory and performance; practice-based research; and feminist adaptations of Greek Tragedy. In his work with the Advocating Classics Education project (ACE) he researches public impact. Marcus has performed with Matthew Bourne's company New Adventures and



trained with Ballet Boyz. He has also choreographed music videos for queer artists such as itoldyouiwouldeatyou.



Vivienne Youel (Music)

Vivienne is a songwriter and composer for worldwide publisher, Audio Network, and vocalist and guitarist of YOUEL and Sun Bloom band. She writes in multiple genres, including indie-electro pop, jazz, acoustic folk, rock and classical. She also composes music for theatre, having worked with Emma Rice from The Globe Theatre, London & Kneehigh Theatre, in research and development for a new show. She has previously written music for By Jove's *Here She Comes*.

Wendy Haines (Head Writer) Wendy is a playwright, poet, and script-editor based in South West London with a particular interest in feminism, science fiction, and magical realism. She has penned many a project for By Jove, including *Before They Told You What You Are* and *Medea*, and was programmed for the One-Act Festival at Stockwell Playhouse in 2019 with her play *Beautiful Halo*.





Susanne Dye (Movement Director)

Susanna brings together her experience in theatre and dance, in her work with actor movement. She studied Movement Direction at the Royal Central School of Speech and Drama. She also works in the field of contemporary dance where she trains, performs and teaches with Candoco, the contemporary dance company for disabled and non disabled dancers. She has movement directed with By Jove on productions

including Pride & Prejudice: the Panto, Margaret of Anjou and Medea.

By Jove are a socialist feminist theatre company. We're socialists, we're feminists, and we make theatre together.

We tell old stories in new ways. We think about how myths, legends, and tales from the cultural canon – some familiar, some less so – can speak to audiences in the 21st century.

His fourth radio play *Košice 1923* for four Czech and Slovak actresses of four different generations had its broadcast on Czech Radio 3 on 8 October 2019. For 1–2 November, he is directing a double-bill student production of Aphra Behn's *The Young King, or The Mistake,* and a new play about the art collector and oil magnate Calouste Gulbenkian, co-written with Josh Overton, entitled *Oil: The Story of Mr Five Per Cent and His Seven Sisters*.

Drama at Hull

About GOTH

Gender and Otherness in the Humanities (GOTH) is a research centre based in the School of Arts and Humanities, Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences at The Open University. Our interests are broadranging across research areas: our affiliated academics work in a variety of fields within the Humanities including English Literature, Creative Writing, Music, History, Theatre Studies, Art History, Classical Studies and more, exploring topics related to the themes of gender and otherness. GOTH was relaunched in 2019 from its previous incarnation, GiTH (Gender in the Humanities). Its new name underlines gender's often complex intersections with different types of 'otherness'. Gender is a particular aspect of the broader characterisation of 'otherness' as a deviation from 'the norm'. The relationship between gender and otherness throughout time and across the Arts and Humanities forms the focal point of our investigations. This relationship is multifarious: people are othered due to their gender, or their expression of their gender; gender plays a role within intersectional identities, leading to more complex forms of otherness; gender politics can itself be intersected by various kinds of othering; and there are those who feel othered by the very concept of gender. The diverse facets of the relationship between gender and otherness form a rich array of material for academic study, and are of great significance in modern scholarship. Apart from this central focus, we also encourage and support research in otherness more broadly: an awareness of the centrality of human diversity to an understanding of the Humanities is crucial to The Open University, to our exceptionally large and diverse student body, our research and teaching goals, and our impact on society.

GOTH will pull together the valuable OU research being carried out in these areas, finding points of connection and contrast and providing a space for fruitful discussion and collaboration between academics across the Humanities. We run regular critical reading sessions based at Walton Hall campus in Milton Keynes. We also organise twice-yearly research away days to relevant exhibitions, historical sites, and other accessible locations, where we learn from each other's research interests on site. Additional types of events we organise include conferences and research seminars, the hosting of visiting scholars, supporting and initiating bidding for research funding, and working on doctoral and other research projects, both within the group and in collaboration with external scholars. We are currently seeking applicants for a funded PhD studentship; see our website for

details.
