Rebecca is a Research Associate and a University Teacher working across the University of Sheffield's Department of Sociological Studies and the School of Education. Rebecca graduated from the University of Sheffield after having completed her ESRC-funded PhD in the field of Human Geography. Rebecca's doctoral thesis entitled '*Navigating the Higher Education Border: Routes to Belonging for Forced Migrant Students in the UK & Sweden*', is a comparative study exploring the role of universities in creating 'routes to belonging' for forced migrant students in the UK and Sweden.

From 2008 - 2018, Rebecca founded and acted as the Director of the Article 26 project, which worked in partnership with UK universities to create scholarships for forced migrant students. This project has been integrated into [Universities of Sanctuary](#) and Rebecca continues her involvement as a member of the steering committee. Recent publications include the compendium of [Sanctuary Scholarship](#) resources (2018), which were created in collaboration with three UK universities, the 'Let us Learn' initiative and three sanctuary scholars supported by the project. '[Education for All](#)' (2014) was published to support the transition from external management to mainstreaming and embedding scholarship schemes for forced migrants within university services.'
